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VILLA READY TO MARCH ON THE CAPITAL

REVIEWS TROOPS TODAY ON CELEBRATION PROGRAM OVER VICTORY

CHIHUAHUA NEXT MOTIVE

Every Indication That Villa's March Toward Mexico City Is to Be Unhindered Particularly, Is Given Today. Soldiers and Juarez Merchants Fight Over Rebel Currency

El Paso, Nov. 28.—General Villa today reviewed the rebel troops as a celebration of his victory at Tierra Blanca, but even while it was in progress he was giving orders toward hastening his departure to the southward. He will first attack Chihuahua and then move against the capital. He said he thought he could leave Juarez tonight or Saturday.

Juarez citizens are anxious to see his departure for the dispute between soldiers who want to purchase goods with rebel money, and the local merchants who refuse to accept it, is growing bitter. Merchants are alarmed at Villa's threats to confiscate the stocks if they didn't take the rebel currency, and are still more alarmed by the threat of the soldiers to start looting.

More Warships Needed
Washington, Nov. 28.—More warships for Mexican waters is the administration program. It is announced by the navy department that the battleships Connecticut, Kansas and Ohio, comprising the fourth division of the Atlantic fleet, will be off for Vera Cruz by December 21. They are now in the Mediterranean, but have been ordered to sail not later than Monday.

Boise, Nov. 28.—(Special)—Boise high school won the football championship of the northwest in the scholastic division when Coach Worthwine's warriors defeated Lincoln high school of Portland at the Boise park on Thanksgiving afternoon, 14 to 2. Boise outplayed Portland, and the score tells the story to a large extent of the relative merits of the two teams. It was a game that will stand out for some time to come as one of the most spectacular ever played in this city.

Boise scored two touchdowns in the last quarter.

DRY ELECTIONS IN MANY CITIES OF THE STATE MAY BE DECLARED TO BE VOID

Circuit Court Knocks Out Over A Half Dozen Victories November 4th

Salem, Nov. 28.—Every local option election held in Oregon November 4th, except in towns where regular city elections were held, is void, according to a decision of Circuit Judge Galloway in a suit brought by John Stillman, representing the saloon interests of Salem to restrain the court from issuing an order declaring Salem dry as the result of the last election. The decision is statewide in its scope, and if the supreme court sustains Galloway, victories for drys in a half dozen or more cities will be void.

SEND PACKAGES EARLY IS WARNING FROM POSTOFFICE

There are prominent signs posted in the postoffice today to the effect that "Parcels should be mailed early, wrapped securely and marked plainly." In addition to the foregoing sentence there is this significant postscript: "You may write on Christmas packages, 'Not to be opened until Christmas.' This is unusual for under other circumstances such packages would, with the writing on it, have to be paid for at first-class rates. But all such packages will go at the regular parcel post rates. All this is done for the purpose of making the business lighter on the postal clerks during the holiday season and of allowing them to enjoy the day as other people do. In addition to the heavy mail of last year the parcel post business has increased with such leaps and bounds in the last year that the department is desirous of spreading out the business in order that it may attend to all of it before Christmas."

TOM BAKER SHOWS IMPROVEMENT

Friends of Tom Baker yesterday pleaded for the demented Island City man and he was not sent to the Penitentiary insane hospital as had been ordered. It was felt by physicians yesterday morning that Mr. Baker would either succumb to the attack or would recover in a few days and consequently he was placed in the La Grande hospital, where he is much better today.

Henry M. Pindell, Editor and Banker, Ambassador to Russia



HENRY M. PINDELL, a banker and editor of Peoria, Ill., is the new ambassador to Russia. While Mr. Pindell is not especially prominent outside of his own state, he is a man of high standing and cultured attainments. He gained the favor of President Wilson by swinging the vote of the Illinois delegation at the Baltimore convention for the New Jersey governor. As an editor of influence he backed Mr. Wilson from the start and aided the candidate in his western tour. Mr. Pindell's name had been mentioned for comptroller of the currency, but he declined that position. He was suitable to the czar and his advisers as ambassador.

Washington, Nov. 28.—The White House today refused to admit that Mr. and Mrs. Francis Sayre were there, although they dropped in for dinner yesterday unexpectedly. The request for publicity to the plans entertained for the couple, were ignored. It is intimated by friends of the couple that they will accompany the president to New York and will sail tomorrow for Europe.

Late this afternoon President Wilson, his daughter Eleanor, Dr. Grayson and Secretary Tumulty started for New York to attend the navy-army game tomorrow. Still later, and from another entrance, Mr. and Mrs. Sayre left for the New York train hurriedly, having been indoors all day as was thought to be the case.

SINNOTT GETS PET CLAUSE IN CURRENCY BILL

OREGON CONGRESSMAN WINS OUT IN FIGHT AGAINST BANK DIRECTORS

BOTH WINGS ADOPT PLAN

Currency Bill, When Passed, Will Prevent Stockholders, Directors or Officers in Private Banks From Holding Offices as Directors in Regional Banks to Be Established

Washington, Nov. 28.—The currency caucus has progressed rapidly. It is expected the bill will be completed tomorrow night and that debate on the measure will start Monday.

Washington, Nov. 28.—Congressman N. J. Sinnott of Oregon scored heavily as a currency legislator yesterday when Senators Owen and Hitchcock, leaders of the majority and minority wings of the senate committee on banking and currency, both incorporated in their bills, just introduced, Sinnott's "stockholder" amendment.

This amendment prohibits stockholders as well as officers and directors of any bank from being appointed class B directors in any regional reserve bank to be established by the new currency bill.

The currency bill as passed by the house specifically states that class B directors are intended to represent the general public's interests of each district and for this reason the bill ex- with officers and directors of a bank, on the supposition that they might represent the interest of the bank rather than the public. Believing that stockholders had a parity of interest with officers and directors of a bank, Sinnott on September 15, last, introduced his amendment in the house, adding that stockholders be excluded from the list and made an amendment which was voted down by the democratic majority at that time. It has now been embodied in the bills introduced by both wings of the senate currency committee.
