YOUNGSTERS SHOW TOO MUCH PEP AND WIN

Alumni, Lacking Practice, Stay With
Sinking Titanic Nobly

Lightning plays and elegant team work fiddled the swan song for the alumni yesterday afternoon when the scholasticians not only crumbled the sheepskinners' line, but capered and gamboled with the said forward pass which customarily is good for about 30 yards. With Coach Reynolds heaving the spheroid and fleetfooted ends and halves to take the tosses, the school team fairly bewildered the old style football stars. With brazen effrontery the high school backfield sent Hunter, Oliver and Couch through the center of what was thought to be an impregnable line with such regularity and consistency that first downs on straight football were numerous. Hunter and Oliver were playing their last games and got away from scholastic football with glory hanging to them in great gobs. The school team had the punch that wasn't expected; had the open field work where it was perfection and had a defensive ability that broke up alumni plays before they got off.

The first touchdown was the direct result of a fumbled punt, but after that the high school run 'em over, tossed 'em over, kicked 'em over, carried 'em over and did most anything they wanted to. The reason was apparent from the first down. The alumni squad had one practice, and proved conclusively that football without practice is an impossibility. Last year with a month's drill much the same team had an aggressive attack and strong defense, sufficient to swamp what was an awful good high school team.

The final score was 31 for the high school, with the alumni not close enough to be particularly dangerous at any time. In the second and fourths the alumni hung together better and as the game progressed the old timers could stop regulation football, but never did "savy" the aerial stuff. The presence of Coach Reynolds in the game was a remarkable stimulus, and with his characteristic noodle he dared

to do just what he was not expected to do. With his second-string men playing in the last half he essayed little else than trick and forward pass plays. Conkey tried one goal from placement and got away with it, pupted up to his usual standard and punted out on two different occasions — some performance in itself.

For the alumni, there was strenuous individual, but not team work, and at no time did the "has beens" desert the sinking ship. They did not win, but it was no individual's fault—the lack of training principally. SOCIAL JUSTICE.

Conservative old Great Britain is making great advances along democratic lines for the welfare of the masses and is at least twenty-five years ahead of America. Lloyd-George pointed out in almost precisely the same words as Roosevelt that this progressive legislation or liberal movement stands between anarchy and conservative rights of property. Unless justice is accorded to the masses they will obtain it by violent means and in a spirit of revenge.

In America and England the masses intend coming into their own. Lloyd-George impressed me as a man of great vision, garmented with reserve; a sympathetic man, free from sham and devoted to a cause and not forgetting the plain people from whom he sprang. The reason England is so far ahead of us is largely because we still have the old fetish of state rights. England already has much social justice legislation. With us the people are just being educated. England can proceed faster because it has one central government, while we have forty-eight state legislatures. State rights are advantageous in many respects, but we must nationalize necessary legislation to redress national evils.—Oscar Straus, Member of Permanent Court of Arbitration at The Hague.
