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ARMY SURPRISES FOOTBALL WORLD AND WINS OVER NAVY BY DECISIVE SCORE OF 22-9

Underdogs, And Outweighed, West Pointers Trowned Navy

New York, Nov. 29.—Picked to lose and the under dogs, West Point cadets today fairly swamped the navy in the annual army-navy game. The army scored 22 points made up of one field goal and three touchdowns, while the navy, the favorites in the betting, scored three field goals for a total of 9 points. The victory is the first the army has scored in four games, and was the crowning feature of a slightly checkered career this fall.

President Wilson, forty active and retired admirals and generals, and nearly 40,000 others witnessed the game. The middies outweighed the West Pointers six pounds to the man and they were the favorites.

A drizzling rain, making the game uncertain, prevailed for a time but changed sufficiently to let the game go on. It was very cold.

It was the army mule and navy goat at the Polo grounds today and in that direction all roads from Washington, Baltimore and Philadelphia pointed. Army and navy officers and high government officials from Washington and surrounding army and naval stations were on hand. President Wilson was an honored guest of the contending United States academies. Secretary of the Navy Joseph Daniels sat with the middies from Annapolis.

Secretary of War Lindley M. Garrison, as was the custom, occupied the box of honor in front of the stands reserved for the gray uniformed cadets from West Point. Society was out in force, the brilliant scenes in the stands rivalling even the scenes presented by the stands at Meadowbrook when the American poloists showed the way to their British opponents last spring.

With a record of only one touchdown against them this season and that made by Bucknell, defeated by a score of 70 to 7, the navy had the edge in the betting today. The cadets were considered on the short end of 10 to 7 and 19 to 8 bets by virtue of their one defeat by Notre Dame by 35 to 18 and the close score in the Colgate and Tufts games, which were 7-6 and 2-6 respectively.

Long before play was called, the grandstands, bleachers and specially constructed stands and boxes along the edges of the field were filled. The navy had been given 14,500 tickets and

the army 12,500. The usual seating capacity of the Polo grounds was added to by the erection of the special stands along the side lines, and approximately 40,000 spectators braved rain to witness the contest. Thirty-eight thousand were on hand before play had been on twenty minutes. Heretofore with one exception, the navy-army game, the greatest athletic contest of the year in the point of general interest and true sport, has been played on the Penn field at Philadelphia. The exception was several years ago when the clash was staged at Princeton on Osborne field. Immediately after that game, however, there was so much objection voiced regarding transportation facilities that the scene was shifted back to Philadelphia. If the usual cry of "ticket scandals" doesn't crop out after this year's contest it is probable that the games will be played in New York at the Polo grounds permanently.

Mexico City, Nov. 29.—Following a long conference between Charge d'Affaires O'Shaughnessy and the Japanese minister, it was persistently rumored in government circles today that a settlement of the Mexican-American difficulties is due in forty-eight hours.
