Guards and One End of About Equal Prowess Everywhere—Other Positions Clearly Cut by Records—Other Sporting News

Three positions on an all-star Eastern Oregon 1913 foot-ball team this year would be filled with the toss of a coin. These three are the guards, and one end. A toss of the coin on any of these three position players would not hit or miss a high school player of particular ability over any other. Baker, Union, Wallowa, La Grande and Pendleton would contribute to the makeup of an all-star cast, and a mighty good team it would be.

not been bested, but neither is he particularly superior to three or four

of the other guards, and it would be a blind guess to name two. There are at least four who are shoulder to shoulder in that position. The same condition exists as with Leffel, Hoff and others on the end positions. Though Kiddle is new in the game he has had nothing put over him this year and would probably be picked by a majority of the critics; remembering the meanwhile that he would have no cinch on the position. He has handled the side pass remarkably well this year and though small, has never been kicked about any in a game this year.

Johnson of Wallowa showed his last year's class in but one game, that at Pendleton Thursday. Injuries kept him out too long to have gained him the distinction which he won last year. Naturally, he is a player of great merit, but was handicapped this season.

Jordan of Pendleton stands alone for the quarterback position in experience, generalship and general ability. Oliver of La Grande, new to Eastern Oregon football, has a mighty punch that would unquestionably get him on a n all-star cast, and his team mates as halves would be decided between McGinnis of Wallowa, Goodbrod of Union and R. Miller of Baker. McGinnis is a smashing half, something of R. Miller's style, while Oliver is a particularly vicious tackler, runs well in the open as interference and has the punch to put into the line smashes.

Football was productive of no scintillating constellations. The nearest that any can approach such a territorial distinction would be McClaren for his marvelous running, catches of forward passes, and general ability on the position, and Conkey with his kicking. Conkey has out booted by a wide margin any opponent kicker this year.

When any critic attempts to fill the guard positions on such a team or names a second end, he is doing it largely on hair-splitting lines for there is no real distinction in the players for that position on at least three of the Eastern Oregon teams
