ORANGES WILL BE IMPROVED

GENERALLY BELIEVED PRICES WILL SINK

Lemons on the Other Hand Will Probably Remain as They are.

Oranges will probably be of a better grade this year than last and will likely be cheaper. The crop is generally reported as being good and within a few days shipments are expected which will improve the quality and the size of oranges sold locally. Lemons on the other hand will remain high during the winter, report wholesalers as the crop is light. It is doubtful if the price will be lowered at all over what it has been in the past.
