Tschalkowsky was a lawyer; Cesar Cul was professor of fortifications in the Military Academy of St. Petersburg and is today lieutenant general of Russian engineers; Borodine was a physician; Rimsky-Korsakov was an officer in the Russian navy; Scriabin was a timber merchant; Moussorgsky was a soldier, being an officer in one of the most famous regiments, and Sokalsky was in the diplomatic service, being stationed for several years in New York and afterward becoming editor of the principal newspaper of Odessa.—Ladies' Home Journal.
