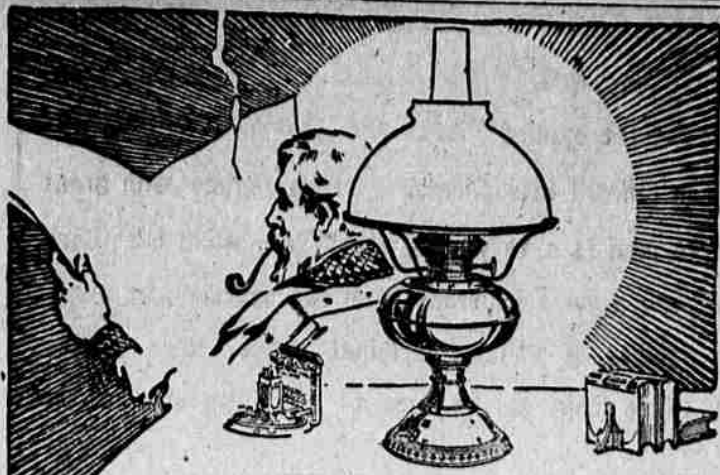

POTATO CROP IS STAGNANT

LITTLE TRADING IN SPUDS AT PORTLAND.

Growers Willing to Let Go at Smaller Figures From Now on.

Almost complete stagnation is showing in the potato trade in Portland. The jobbing business along Front street, of Portland, is exceedingly small and there is but little call from the outside for supplies.

While no further change is announced in quotations, there is little inclination among buyers to take hold except for extra fancy selected stock and even for that quality the demand is not really brisk.

The market for Oregon potatoes in San Francisco is rather weak and while in a nominal way as high as \$1.40 a cental is still being obtained for the extra select stock of this section, still little business is reported even for best above \$1.25 and sales are sometimes reported down to \$1. The cost of making shipments from this section to San Francisco, including freight and commissions, is 40c a cental and to this must be added a profit for the buyer at this end of the line.

Growers are showing more disposition to let go of some of their supplies. Some that were offered from 90c to \$1 a cental a few weeks ago are today seeking buyers for their supplies at 75c. The local trade has practically all of its immediate trade requirements and is not inclined to speculate on the future.
