NEW HIGHWAY IS TALKED OF

UMATILLA COUNTY FARMERS ADVANCE PLANS.

Road to Tap Wheat Belt Is Being Discussed at Pendleton.

With the adoption of resolutions touching various phases of the convention, the state convention of Oregon Farmers' Union came to a close last evening. The convention was held in the L. D. S. tabernacle, which organization threw open its doors to the convention with the public spirit that characterizes the church's endeavors to assist the city as a whole at every opportunity. The next meeting place will be determined by the executive board.

Farm Credits Needed.

A. R. Shumway of Milton, one of the star members of the Farmers' Union, and one of the committee on legislation, left this morning for his home after doing some very effective work for the union during the sessions just closed. Before leaving he gave out the information that the commission which went to Europe, of which Professor Macpherson of the O. A. C. was a member, to study rural credits and marketing and other topics concerning agriculture, will meet soon in the city of Washington D. C., to draft a bill for the federal legislature, recommending a long term mortgage on loans secured from the United States national banks. He declared it to be the purpose of the union to secure similar legislation in all of the separate state providing for short term loans. This matter will be brought before the legislature at Salem at its next session and every

hope is entertained that it will pass without much trouble.

Loans made on the federal plan and with funds lent by the United States government will allow a period of some 30 or 40 years at a low rate of interest in which to repay the principal. It is thought this measure will do more to get people back on the farm than any other measure heretofore enacted. Mr. Shumway is enthusiastic about the matter and is going to devote a great deal of time to the measure.

M. Friedler, president of the Farmers' Union in Umatilla county and one of the active members of the good roads committee left this morning for Pendleton. Mr. Friedler is advocating a good road from Pendleton to the Columbia river, claiming that it will tap one of the principal wheat belts of Eastern Oregon. It will be a river grade all the way and will make transportation considerably cheaper than at present. To do this it will be necessary to secure some change to the present state law covering good roads. As this falls within the province of A. R. Shumway. Mr. Friedler could not predict anything as to the nature of the change or the time when it could be accomplished.
