PIONEER OF '64 GOES TO SEE FAT STOCK SHOW

Hurricane Deck of Prairie Schooner and Pullman Cars Familiar to Grande Ronde Settler.

Mr. and Mrs. James Moss of Alicel, left this noon for Portland where they will take in the stock show during the coming week. In speaking of his early coming to the valley Mr. Moss had this to say: "I came to this country in '64 on the hurricane deck of a prairie schooner drawn by oxen. I was then nine years of age when my parents set out from Iowa for the west. There was no town here then and but a few shacks in what is now south La Grande. I remember a Fourth of July celebration when there were more Indians present than whites; they came in all of their fine colors and feathers; they had the

finest horses and did things in great fashion. You ask, where did we get our supplies? Well my young man, we had to go all the way to Walla Walla by ox team and that was slow traveling. We hauled the first load of wheat raised in this valley 165 miles to a mill. The first plow, if I remember correctly, was made by a man by the name of Tom Russell. It was a sod plow and with it we did all of our plowing. Our house was built of logs; part of it is still standing. This younger generation does not know what it is to undergo hardship."
