JOSEPH YOUTH IN NAVY, DIES

DEATH STOPS RAPID ADVANCEMENT IN SERVICE

Game Warden Lefel Arrests Trapper Who Has no License.

Joseph, Dec. 10.—Last week word was received in this city of the death of Edgar Martin, son of John Martin, a well-known resident of Joseph at Las Animas, Colo. Two years ago the boy joined the navy and had been making rapid strides in the service. He was for a time on the battleship South Dakota and was recently transferred to the hospital for treatment, having contracted quick consumption. The news of his death was a great shock to this community as he was a well known and highly respected young man, popular with all who knew him. The body arrived last Saturday noon and the funeral was held the same afternoon at 1:30. Edgar Martin was born at Joseph, Oregon, on February 25, 1895 and at the time of his death was 18 years, 9 months and 5 days old. Besides his bereaved father and mother, he left to mourn his loss, three sisters, one brother and two half-brothers, and three half-sisters.
