Painful Isolation.

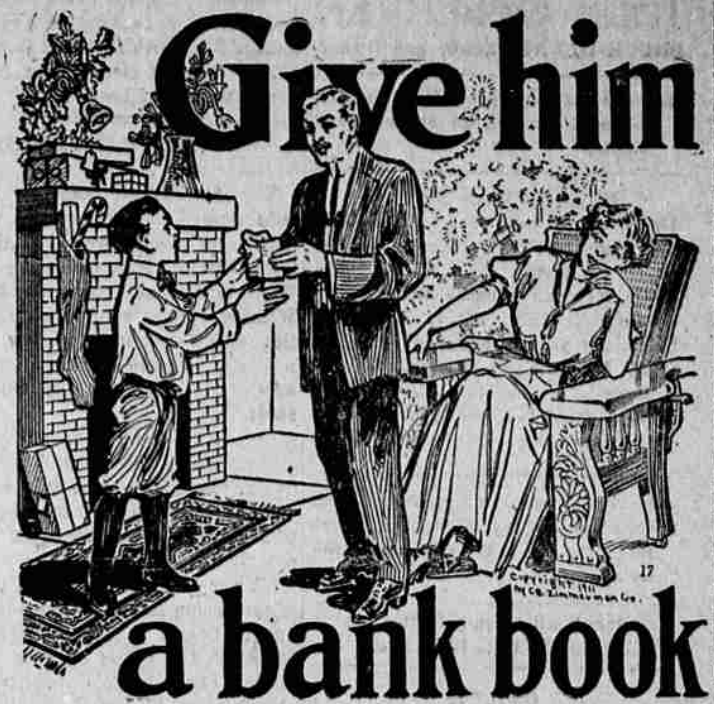
