LITTLE FLUCTUATIONS SEEN IN PRICES.

Stores Full-up Supply of All Necessaries for Christmas.

**SHOP EARLY, CRY AGAIN.** On the whole the merchant has seen the effects of the campaign for early shopping, but the grocer would like to see improvements further. So with the meat man. "Don't wait until Wednesday night to place your order" is the advice from all the grocers.

Chickens, turkeys, ducks and other niceties required to make up the complete Christmas dinner, are changed but little if any, from Thanksgiving figures. Turkeys sell from 25 to 28 cents and chickens from 18 to 20 cents dressed. Other commodities in the meat line have not moved far out of the even tenor of their price ways the past few days. In the grocery line all that is required for Christmas is on hand. Nuts, cranberries, fruits and all such are nomil in price and plentiful in supply. Oranges are showing an improvement in quality of late and have inclined downward slightly in the past month.
