SPITZENBERGS RULE STRONG

JOCKEYING SAID TO RETARD SALE TO SMALL EXTENT.

Demand for Western Fruit in Eastern Market Continues to Climb.

Good old Spitzenberg, the most prized of Pacific northwest apples, is again coming to the front with a rather extensive demand. While just at present there is more or less "jockeying" between buyers and the sellers regarding the price that should be obtained, nevertheless the market situation is considerably improved in domestic circles.

The Northwestern Fruit Exchange of Portland reports the demand for Spitzenbergs considerably better although values available at this time are not quite as good as a few weeks ago, when the crest of the price wave was reached.

The middle west is after supplies an one car bulletined by the Portland exchange recently found five anxious buyers in the morning. The fruit was from Rogue river and finally sold at \$1.75 a box f. o. b. Medford for extra fancy and \$1.50 for fancy.

Quite a fair demand is shown by New York exporters for Arkansas Black but no sales have been reported because the holders are asking full values while inquirers are asking a concession.

"The situation is much improved," said A. A. Prince, assistant sales manager of the Northwestern Fruit Exchange. "There is a livelier demand than for some days and indications point to values holding rather well."

One of the features of especial interest is the demand for export. A state exchange reports the sale of a number of cars of fruit to go abroad but space on the steamships leaving New York could not be secured for two of these cars.

The New York demand is confined almost exclusively to storage stock and no fresh shipments are at present being sought by the trade there

BUTTER LAW?

If not, read the following law and have your Butter Wrappers nicely printed, with your name and weight of butter thereon.

CAUTION!

CHAPTER 179, SECTION 3.

"It shall be unlawful for any person, firm, association or corporation to sell, offer or expose for sale, any short weight butter within the State of Oregon. All butter sold or exposed or offered for sale in rolls, prints or squares within the State of Oregon, shall be plainly marked: 'Eight ounces, full weight,' sixteen ounces, full weight, 'twenty-four ounces full weight,' or 'thirty-two ounces, full weight,' every roll, print or square sold, offered or exposed for sale shall contain the number of ounces marked thereon; and any person, firm, association or corporation violating any of the provisions of this act, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be punished by a fine or not less than \$25.00 nor more than \$100.00, or by imprisonment in the county jail for not less than six months; or both such fine and imprisonment."
