COLLEGE AT PULLMAN BUSY

SPECIAL TRAINS CARRY THE STUDENTS TO HOMES.

Agricultural Agents Being Appointed Throughout Washington.

State College, Pullman, Wash., Dec. 23.—Two special trains, one run by the Northern Pacific, the other by the Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul line, left Pullman Friday evening, December 19, taking homeward the western and central Washington student delegations of the state college. The King county delegation alone amounts to 70 students. Pierce has 38, Snohomish 43, Yakima 41. From the other 20 and some odd counties served either directly or by connections by the two west side specials, there are at the college a little above 500 west side students, the great majority of whom will return home for the Christmas holidays.

Competition between the rival roads has developed a rather unusual spectacle, so far as the Milwaukee train is concerned. That road has in its west side special, duplicated its "Olympian," the finest passenger train it runs, equipped with all modern paraphernalia of palaces on wheels, including a piano and barber shop, also diner, sleeper, day coaches and baggage cars.

No less splendid is the equipment sent out by the Northern Pacific. Since the Milwaukee special handled mainly the "through" passengers, and the Northern Pacific those dropping off between here and the coast, odds somewhat favored the Northern Pacific train. The Milwaukee train left Pullman via the line of the O. & W. and join its own road near Rosalia, where there is a physical connection. The Northern Pacific train left on its own line.

Five applications for county agricultural agents have been received by Director I. D. Cardiff, during the present month. They come from King, Cowlitz, San Juan, Okanogan, Douglas, and Snohomish counties. Mr. A. M. Richardson, an agricultural graduate of the state college, who has been teaching agriculture in the Snohomish high school, has been appointed county agricultural agent of Douglas county. Director Cardiff at the present week is making a trip through western Washington in the interests of the bureau of farm development of the state. Under an agreement recently reached by Director Cardiff and Professor W. J. Spillman, of Washington, D. C., Byron Hunter has been appointed state leader and in this capacity will have direct charge of the county agricultural agents of Washington. In this capacity he becomes vice-director of the state bureau of farm development. Mr. Hunter is one of the earlier agricultural graduates of the state college. Since his graduation, he has been engaged in farm development work in Washington, Oregon, Idaho, Montana and one or two other western states. He is particularly in touch with Washington problems, and by the authorities at Washington, D. C., is considered as one of the best trained experts in the country.
