Fowl, ample to meet every reasonable demand, are carried by local merchants on Christmas eve, and shopping will have to be brisk tonight and before 9 tomorrow morning if the local dealers get rid of all turkeys, ducks and geese that were in readiness for the buyers this morning when the stores opened. Customers should remember that there will be no deliveries tomorrow anywhere, but that the meat shops will be open until 9 only and grocery stores not at all.
