Air Compressor and New Boiler Are
Newest O.-W. Equipment.

An air compressor of 100 horsepower strength, and a 100-horsepower boiler are two of the latest pieces of equipment added to the O.-W. shops.

This makes a total of three boilers of 100 horsepower capacity each and enables the company to do practically all of its repair work here. The air compressor is one of the sources of power for most of the machines and drills used in the machine shop and makes the shop complete in this respect. Compressed air is piped along the house track and enables workmen to make hasty and needed repairs to trains that are in transit.

SECRETARY ANDREWS OF AUTO
CLUB DEFENDS DRIVERS.

Club Keeps Eagle Eye out for Any
Violation of City Ordinances.

A. V. Andrews, secretary of the Union County Automobile club, is positive that few cities in the whole country have better respected automobile laws than has La Grande. He cites the very few accidents that have occurred here and points to only one cause—careful driving.

Today he handed in the following communication regarding criticism of automobile drivers, which he deems is unjust:

Editor Observer:—It is quite evident from the criticism of automobile drivers appearing in a morning paper that the criticism was given without investigation. It is a matter of common knowledge that accidents have been few in La Grande and that drivers here are very cautious. The speed used in the business district is very low and in the residence section no one has seen such driving as is every day noticed in the larger cities.

We realize that the auto driver is the "goat" for all sharp criticism, but this is entirely unfair. An automobile club of 187 members in this county works in harmony to force respect of all laws by drivers. It is not a club of outlaws but we believe it is composed of as good men and women as there are in the valley, and as secretary of this club, I wish to raise a protest against wanton criticism when it is not deserved.
