What a pity that in these times of high food costs it is impossible to eat olives and amperes, which seem to be the only things on the market that like to associate with people of moderate means!

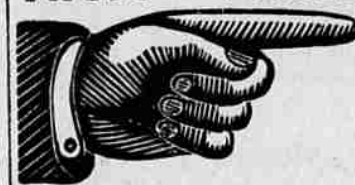
Perhaps smuggling by women might be reduced if the newspapers in New York would refuse to publish photographs of the smugglers and stop describing them as being prominent in society.
