

WORKING GIRLS ORDERS ARRIVE

SECRETARY SMALL SENDS OUT
INSTRUCTIONS.

Copies of the Complete Orders to Be
Here for Distribution.

La Grande merchants, manufacturers and others who come within the pale of the working girls' act promulgated by the Oregon Industrial Welfare commission, are being advised of the details of the new law relative

to employing girls, as they apply to La Grande. Secretary Charles Albert Small, from his office in the Merchants' Protective association is sending out a synopsis of the new rulings and has asked for 100 copies of the complete order that local merchants may become familiar with the rulings and not have to suffer punishment through ignorance later on. Some of the essentials of the new law include:

Minimum wage rate, for experienced adult women, \$8.25 per week. For inexperienced adult women, \$6 per week. "Experienced after one year."

Hour of dismissal in mercantile and manufacturing establishments, 8:30 p. m. This hour of dismissal does not apply to telephone and telegraph

companies, confectionery establishments, restaurants and hotels. Effective February 7.

Every employer is required to keep a copy posted in a conspicuous place in each room in his establishment in which women workers work.

White Bread.

Hygienists have long called attention to the serious consequences of the increasing popular preference for white bread. At present dark colored bread is despised as "peasant's food." In the towns the meanest workman will eat only white bread. The flour used for making this bread is obtained by passing the wheat through a very fine sieve, so that it contains hardly anything but starch and cellulose. White bread, which plays an important role with the French people, is thus extremely poor in really nourishing food, and it is to the increasing consumption of it that many hygienists ascribe in France the rapid enfeeblement, the diminution of stature and even the present development of tuberculosis. Representations have frequently been widely made on this subject, but without effect, for the bakers can provide only what the public demands.—Paris Letter to London Lancet.
