

WIND HURTS WHEAT FIELDS

DANGER TO WHEAT CROP IS SERIOUS ONE

Heavy Wind Raises Trouble In Walla Walla Wheat District.

Walla Walla, Jan. 14.—(Special.)—The wind storm here was one of the worst in many months, the extreme maximum velocity being reached shortly before noon, when 54 miles per hour was registered. This lasted but a minute, however, and the average velocity of the storm is placed between 30 and 40 miles per hour by Observer C. C. Garrett.

Several farmers in the city state that there is considerable fear being expressed by men who have winter wheat in the ground. The ground has long ago been dried out and the dust has been blowing off until the dirt is cleaned up right down to the roots of the wheat, with the result that there is some danger of seriously damaging the crop.
