has been in negotiations for several years over this matter and is now pacified and the city satisfied. A contract along similar lines with W. C. Hansen came up for consideration.

The report of the manager was gone over with considerable care and explanation bringing out the many details of the past week's activities by the manager. The report says:

General Manager's Report:
To the Commission of the City of La Grande Oregon, gentlemen:

The street superintendent expended \$6.00 for shovels, \$39.40 repairing and \$41.25 cleaning streets.

The treasurer collected about \$1000 water rents, \$200 street assessments and interest thereon, \$90 license fees. He redeemed \$2500 of old called warrants and worked on semi-annual report.

Fire department had three chimney and stove pipe fires; called out 15 volunteers once.

Water superintendent expended

\$21.40 on repair work and \$5.25 taking invoice.

Recorder collected \$57.50 fines, street improvements and interest \$49.90; building permit 50c; dog license \$1.00; issued three dray and two taxi licenses; paid to treasurer and drew \$87.10 warrant library expense, seven court cases; four fines and two forfeitures.

The police department arrested 16, released 14, in jail two; fines \$57.50, one place quarantined.

Owner of pest house was informed that we would continue its use and pay three months at a time.

John Wilson was named special policeman at the stock yards to serve without pay. Truant Officer Ellsworth has likewise been vested with police authority without pay.

Fire Calls Discussed.

The upshot of discussion over calling out the volunteer fire department for every alarm turned in, was that when residents have a chimney fire which might need fire protection, the fact should be communicated to the fire station and the facts briefly set

out. The chief has been instructed to use only the paid fire department where calls for chimney fires come in, unless they are in the heart of the business section of the city when a general alarm will be called unless it is obvious that the chemicals can handle it. But for the resident chimney fires the citizens are asked to co-operate with the administration in keeping down expenses. It is found that the fire needs the volunteers, a box alarm can be sent in, but in several instances this winter the city has been put to an expense of \$15 or more when the alarm was merely a chimney fire where there was absolutely no need for the department. However, any fire call from the business center will hereafter necessitate a call of the volunteers as well.
