AGRICULTURAL FAIR HELD AT COLLEGE TODAY.

Two Buildings Required to House Big Showing at Fair.

Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, Jan. 17.—(Special.)—At the regular meeting Tuesday evening the Eastern Oregon club made final arrangements for the annual Eastern Oregon Hop, which will be held in the O. N. G. armory January 30. The different committees have been at work for some time and a big time is assured.

It will take the floor space of both the agricultural buildings to accommodate the agricultural fair held by the Domestic Science and Art departments. On floor of the agricultural building will be devoted to humorous exhibits, dancing and refreshment rooms. Several prizes are offered for the best stunts put on and the competition in these lines is running high.

GOLDEN MILE OF KALGOORLIE

Strength of Territory Has Features That Are Probably Unique in World's History.

Kalgoorlie and Boulder, considerable cities which were born where Pat Hannan scratched but his nuggets in the early days, are noisy with life and ambition, and as long as the Golden Mile strives to sustain them they will continue to thrive and aspire in spite of the immensity and horrible character of the desert land which isolates them from rivers and fertile places and the bounty of a kindly soil. They run with the times; they provide themselves with comforts; they amuse themselves; they are adorned; they regard their duty to the state and consider the future of their children's children. The Golden Mile lies within sight of Hannan's old chum—the smoke and dust and black superstructures of a thin line of deep and vastly rich mines. One of the group—not the pride of them all—must produce \$600 a day to keep the stockholders in good humor with its behavior; and the affection of the directors would be largely increased—it was estimated—if a responsive good conduct should increase even this gratifying yield to \$1,000 a day. Roughly speaking, the Golden Mile and its lesser neighbors of Kalgoorlie—the big shows, as distinguished from the individual enterprises scattered broadcast over the country, which are called little shows—employ 5,000 men and produce \$3,000,000 a year; and the whole field in which the Golden Mile is situated has, from the first days of the Kalgoorlie rush, 20 years ago, produced almost \$58,000,000, which, stated more impressively in dollars, amounts to \$280,000,000. It was pointed out by a furious young member of the labor party of West Australia that the wealth taken from these few miles of wilderness which once were public domain equaled nearly \$600 per capita of the maximum population of the district.
