MANY DETAILS GET ATTENTION

CITY MANAGER'S REPORT PRESENTED.

Transactions of All Departments Past Week Sent Out.

Condensed reports of all heads of departments of the city were outlined in the weekly report of the city manager to the commissioners. The report was:

General Manager's weekly report, week ending Jan. 17, 1914. To the Commissioners of the City of La Grande: The street superintendent spent \$15.12 on repairing tracks and \$54.62 cleaning streets. Engineer had one assistant at \$90 per month, working on assessments and on plats.

The marshal arrested 24 and released 18; in jail at end of week, 6; fines, \$45; one horse in pound. There are many transients recently and the force has been kept busy moving them. Several undesirables making a practice of acting as go-betweens have been prosecuted and convicted of vagrancy.

Recorder reports \$45.00 fines, \$20 sewer, two building permits, \$1.00, 12 court cases, three paid fines and one forfeiture, \$15; drew warrants amounting to \$1586.85; library expense \$59.07; Imp. district interest, \$416.30; final estimate sewer district No. 1, Sec. 4, \$8439.46; issued three pool licenses, one moving picture, one plumbing license.

Water superintendent spent \$24.45 repairing, invoicing and penalty work.

Fire department put out fire in Model bakery; Mrs. Gangloff has building insured for \$1500, loss \$370; bakery insurance \$1500, loss \$630; co-operative store insured \$2600, loss \$390.

Treasurer collected \$180 for licenses, \$155.41 street assessments and interest, \$557.38 water rents, received turnover from county treasurer \$439.92, closed books for six months ending Dec. 31, and paid improvement bonds interest \$384.43, and warrants \$3061.28.

Have drawn up resolution refunding Mr. Knapp \$5.00 and allowing him \$5.00 for his expense on horse bought on sale from pound and found to have been taken up outside of the city at Mr. Hiatt's place at his instance.

The ordinance for liquor license should be revised and license revocal be made optional on first offense and obligatory on second or third. Also a new ordinance should be drawn covering the go-between business on liquor and other things. Received letter from Spencer of O. W. R. & N. Co., relating to subway; filed with recorder. Have not heard from bond company.

Have taken up delinquent sewer liens out between Adams and Jefferson avenues similar to the one disposed of at last meeting and gave notice of delinquency to several; some in person and some by letter.
