Zeppelin's Adventurous Career. "Let us resolve to live long," said a German cavalry officer, addressing comrades who had assembled to celebrate the seventy-fifth birthday of Count Zeppelin. "The evening shadows were already gathering when this man surprised the world with his work. That sometimes happens to a man whose morning and noon were quiet and devoid of adventure, but his has not been a life of that kind. In the Civil war in the United States he barely escaped with his life. In the war of 1866 he plunged into the River Main, horse and man fully accoutred, and swam the stream; in the war of 1870 he risked his life by riding unaccompanied into the camp of the enemy, and as a retired general of cavalry entitled to rest he appeared in a new role, allowed himself to be laughed at and then, with a great leap into the air, became the most popular man in Germany."
