TWO CABINET MEN COMING.

(Continued from Page One.)

Friday will hear the views and opinions of Oregon bankers and business men generally on the proposed establishment of eight or 12 federal reserve centers as the new law provides, and on the districts that those respective centers shall serve. These two members of Wilson's cabinet comprise the organization committee of the federal reserve board. The other member of the committee John Skelton Williams, the newly-appointed controller of the currency. They together with four men to be named by the president, will compose the federal reserve board, and will have full control

and operation of the currency system of the country after the law becomes effective.

Branch Only Wanted.

Pendleton, Jan. 27.—W. L. Thompson, president of the American National bank of Pendleton, and also president of the Oregon State Bankers' association, is in receipt of a notice and personal invitation urging his attendance at the meeting to be held in Portland Friday evening for the reception of William C. McAdoo, secretary of the treasury, and Dr. David F. Houston, secretary of agriculture, and their party, who are making a visit to the Pacific coast, looking to the location of a regional reserve bank west of the Rocky Mountains. Invitations of a like nature will be sent out to bank officials throughout the northwest, and Portland hopes to have one of the largest and most representative meetings of this kind ever held in the state.

In talking over the matter, Mr. Thompson said that while business men first talked of trying to get a regional reserve bank for the northwestern states, Oregon, Washington, Idaho and Montana, located at Portland, that personally he feels a better solution of the problem would be to have one regional reserve bank located at San Francisco, with a branch at Portland; which would answer all the uses of one bank at Portland, and yet would make the financial situation much stronger on the coast than to have two smaller banks, one at Portland and one at San Francisco, were this scheme practicable.

It is a well known fact that business follows transportation, and that transportation follows water lines, hence the business of the northwest naturally follows the Columbia river into Portland which makes it the real financial center for the interior region and the proper location for a branch of the regional reserve bank, rather than some of the other northwestern cities. As an example of the

way the business runs from this part of the country, it is cited that during the year of 1913 the American National bank issued drafts on Portland banks to the amount of \$3,000,000, while the exchange to Seattle was only about \$500,000, and one-half as much on Spokane, so that there was easily four times as much business done through the Portland banks as through the other two combined.

It is evident that the committee has in mind establishing only eight banks at the outset, although the law makes 12 possible.

There are three questions for the visiting committee to consider: First, location of the bank itself; second, territory, and, third, the probable distribution of branch banks within the same territory.

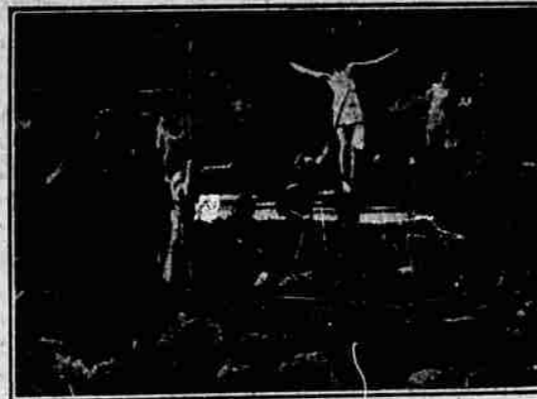
