in the new law is not explained but seems readily understood.

County Judge Henry is about to come to the last lap of his four-year term, and though he is considering the matter of running for office once again, he has not said the word, either negatively or affirmatively. The next week or two will probably develop an answer from him on the subject. Notwithstanding that he has not announced his intentions, no other man has come out for the job, though several are discussed informally by political gossipers.

County Commissioner Cecil Galloway, of Elgin, is the only commissioner to have his job come to an end, but while Cecil has not avowed himself, his friends expect him to run, even in the face of statements made some time ago that he had no intentions of seeking office again.

The county clerk job is, to all appearances, to be one of the chief features of the primary campaign. Lee Warnick has been rumored as a democratic aspirant, but this Mr. Warnick denies.

Sheriff Hug is not what is called a politician and therefore does not see the necessity of early alignment of his rods, but his friends admit that they have their ears to the ground to some extent and will unquestionably urge his to be a candidate on the republican side of the fence.

David Proctor is a candidate for the republican nomination to the office of recorder. He admits as much and intends to commence his campaign early.

John Frawley, old time republican, is out after his treasury job again, "and of course, it is a foregone conclusion that none will run against him," say his friends.

The county surveyor job will probably see the present incumbent run, and as "Doc" Curtis is a democrat, the republican column has a place in the primaries. Curtis has not made his formal statement one way or the other yet.

Dr. C. T. Bacon has not decided upon his political aspirations for county coroner.

representative to fill the shoes of C. J. Forsstrom the North Powder merchant. The joint representativeship held by John McDonald of Wallowa, is likewise open to a new man or to re-election, but Mr. McDonald has not stepped up and made his little bow, to date.

Senator Kiddle holds for another term, therefore there will be no race there. Assessor Couch holds over, as does Mrs. Ivanhoe, county superintendent of schools.

Thus, it develops, there is nothing very marked about the way the county political pot is brewing at this writing, but it is a safe bet that before February is written on history's pages, politicians will be swarming and lightning rods go up here and there, and the game be on in full blast for the following slate of events to come in a political way shows the imperativeness of immediate action, a la politics.
