

MILTON HIGH LEFT BEHIND

HAS NO SEMBLANCE OF CHANCE
WITH LOCAL FIVE.

Game Characterized By Lack of Wanton Roughness—Floor Work Fast.

Without need of much strenuous effort La Grande high ran away from Milton high school Saturday night and registered a total score of 48 against the Miltonites while the team from the fringe town heaved a mere handful of points. La Grande's quintet left the visitors at the start and as the game progressed, drew away until there was no semblance of closeness in the score. A hoodoo of hard luck, at that, camped on the La Grande forwards and basket after basket was missed by the narrowest margin. The score doesn't represent the difference in the strength of the two teams, for the visitors had but little claim to high school laurel wreaths before they started on the present tour, and now have none. They defeated Haines and Porth Powder, but fell before Union and La Grande.

The redeeming feature of the visitors' play was the lack of wanton and wilful roughing that frequently crops out in scholastic ball.

While the La Grangers were shooting baskets with enough success to score nearly a half hundred points, they kept the visiting forwards well guarded and three baskets was the sum total of their shoots. The home team played well together especially in floor work, where lightning foot-

work and passing made the visitors dizzy. An additional 20 or 30 points in the La Grande column would have about spelled the real difference in the general strength of the two teams.

The victory goes far towards cleaning up to the final set-to with Union which to all appearances determine the championship of Eastern Oregon. Neither team can claim the undisputed honors until a game is played between the two rivals. The score sheet Saturday evening reads:
