

EVERYBODY IN CHURCH LIKED

FEBRUARY 22 CHOSEN IN LA GRANDE CIRCLES.

Nation-wide Movement is Liked in La Grande it Appears.

La Grande is displaying a great deal of interest in the "Men in Churches" movement. February 22 has been set as the date on which La Grande women and men especially, are urged to attend some church. The movement is nation-wide but in different cities, different dates have been selected—February 22 is La Grande's date. On that day every man in La Grande, regardless of church affiliations or not, is expected to attend some church. The plan is believed to be such as will bring men into church life more intimately, but even if men can be induced to attend church only once a year, the cause is felt to have accomplished some good.

Special Theme at St. Peter's.
On Sunday morning at St. Peter's church, the Rev. Upton H. Gibbs will preach on "The Christian Faith a Divine Revelation and a Human Trust."

Rev. P. W. Fredrick, dean of the Pacific seminary at Portland, will install the Rev. W. C. Drahn pastor of Zion Lutheran church, Sunday morning at 11 o'clock. Professor Fredrick was formerly a professor of the Chicago Lutheran seminary, one of the largest of its kind in the country, and was for several years pastor of the English Lutheran church at Pasadena, Calif. While he is better known as an educator than an author his sermons and addresses are always full of rich and mature thought and of the kind really worth hearing. Rev. Drahn, the local pastor, has been in La Grande nearly a year and has sufficiently made up his mind to make La Grande his future home, to definitely accept the call extended to him last spring. All branches of the work have shown a marked improvement during 1913 and Zion church is looking forward to a very active and prosperous year. Prof. Fredrick will remain in La Grande several days as a guest of Mr. and Mrs. Drahn, in the interest of educational work. Pastor Drahn having been a member of the board of directors for several years, is keenly interested in the welfare of the seminary at Portland.
