The Neighborhood club has voted unanimously to help organize a Parent-teacher Association, to foster it and do all in its power to make such an organization a success and source of mutual improvement.

The object of this movement is to bring the home and school nearer together, to broaden the sympathy and understanding between parent and teacher, to help the parent see the child from the teacher's standpoint and help the teacher to see him from the parent's standpoint to the end that the child may be helped to develop into the highest type of man or woman possible.

These associations are proving very successful and helpful in other places and there is no reason why the same should not be true here.
