EAST AGREED ON APPLES

NORTHWESTERN APPLE A FIXTURE IN GOTHAM.

Arthur M. Geary Pictures Apple Conditions From East Viewpoint.
(By Arthur M. Geary.)

New York, Feb. 11.—(Special).—This season has been a lasting triumph for the apples and pears of the Northwest—lasting both in the sense that they are outlasting their defeated rivals and that the memory of them will last to tickle the palates of the Eastern consumers of years in future. The height of the season for Northwestern fruit was a number of moons ago, but their bright labels are still in evidence, not only in the fancy fruit stands along Broadway but in long rows, each morning, beneath the auction room of the Erie Pier No. 20.

The failure of the apple crop at Watsonville, California, and the shortage of the production in Colorado, with a growing lucrative market in Texas and states close by, has left the "boxed apples of the Northwest in practically undisputed possession of the New York market.

This has been a grand year for the grower, not a bad one for the consumer, but comparatively poor one for the buyer.

Exchange's Aim Successful.

The aim of the Northwestern Fruit Exchange to eliminate some of the middlemen and save the profit to the grower and consumer partially has been successful.

The low prices received for Northwestern apples in 1912 coupled with the advertising and marketing schemes of the co-operative organizations, gave people of all classes a taste which they have not forgotten. However, the demand has not been so keen as to raise the prices out of the reach of the average citizen. Yellow Newtons and Spitzenburgs are now selling at auction for from \$2.00 to \$2.50 a box, which is not greatly in advance of the price paid by the buyers.

The effort to establish direct connections with the markets tributary to New York such as Philadelphia, Newark and Boston, has been criticised by some of the New York dealers as a losing venture for the grower.

"While there are three or four hundred bidders at the daily auction sales in New York," says one, "there are only comparatively few in the

smaller towns. The custom has been for the dealers to come into New York to buy. In this way keen competition, so necessary in auction sales, was attained. Prices are likely to be lower where the number of bidders is smaller."

A. R. Rule Differs From View.

A. R. Rule, the New York representative of the Northwestern Fruit Exchange, differs from this view. He says:

"The prime object of organized selling is more money for grower and lower prices for the consumer. Take Meridian, Miss., for example. They have been buying their fruit through St. Louis. This means that a profit for the St. Louis merchant and the extra local freight must be deducted from the grower's profit or added to the consumer's cost. The Northwestern Fruit Exchange by operating direct will make carlot sales. The result will be greater consumption."

BAKER STOCK HERD BOUGHT

MONTANA BUYERS ACQUIRE POLLMAN HERD.

Deal Said to Be Largest Ever Consummated in Eastern Oregon.

Baker, Feb. 11.—(Special).—The largest cattle deal ever negotiated in Eastern Oregon has just been effected by William Pollman and Thomas Mack who have sold their entire herd in the Baker valley to Anceney & Childs, cattlemen of Bozeman, Montana. The cattle, including, bulls, cows, steers yearling, heifers and calves, several thousand in number, are all thoroughbred range cattle. The entire herd will be shipped to Gallatin, near Bozeman, April 15.

The cattle at present are all on hay in the Baker valley. It is probably the largest herd in Baker county.

Mr. Pollman met C. L. Anceney's partner at Denver and Mr. Anceney came to Baker Wednesday and has been here since arranging for the transfer of the great herd.

Mr. Pollman said today that he intends to retire absolutely from the cattle business. Other interests are so great that he is unable to give the attention he would like to the cattle business and he will sell out his entire holdings, including all his ranches which amount to 6000 acres in Baker county.

He was reticent concerning the price paid for the cattle and also declined to state the exact number of cattle included in the deal.
