WALLOWA CLUB TEAM LOSES

In a slow, ragged game, the M. I. A. A. quintet last night swamped the Wallowa Athletic club team. The game was played at the rink and the enormity of the floor very decidedly slowed up the contest. Both teams were unused to it and ran marathons in a bewildered sort of a way, accomplishing nothing but puffs and perspiration—throughout the first half. All the players got their second wind back after running the 14 miles of the first half, and got to playing basketball. Final score, 29 to 6. Even though distressingly slow, the game was humorous and entertaining. Both teams were panting for wind early in the game and at times the fans got as much sport watching the tired players scramble as they did from basketball.

Wallowa showed surprising strength at the start and the first half score was close, neither team being able to hit the basket, though efforts were frequent. In the last half the M. I. A. A. players tried new tactics—shot baskets at long and hard angles—and made them.

The expected rivalry didn't materialize and the two teams went through the game like the real gentlemen they were. Either team is today complimenting the other on the lack of willful roughness.

In the first half no player could lay claim to honors, for there were none, but in the second Beatty set a pace at floor work that his colleagues tried manfully to emulate, but while the Wallowa clubbers were speeding up and doing a heroic marathon, the home team did likewise, and the margin between points spread rapidly. To give color, both teams threw some hairraising baskets. The game was further enlivened between halves with music from the amateur band, which handled several selections with surprising skill.
