ful about the things it said of its preceptor, to speak to him or her curiously, and all that, does any person think the child would feel like antagonizing its teacher, making war on it or of doing anything that would be painful? Never.

On the other hand if the child heard its parents speak of the teacher as incompetent, as spiteful, as narrow-minded, and willing to use the rod without any excuse, does any reasoning person think that child is going to be sweet tempered, tractable, and as willing to learn as in the other case? Never, for the child respects the words of its parents and gets its inspiration from it. The child is between two feelings, that of enforced obedience with disrespect in its heart and the created feeling in the breast of the teacher. This is part of the psychology of the case but not all. The meeting will make clear many things that have heretofore remained dark and dismal to many parents.

Men are going to talk at this meeting and women too, who have struggled day in and out with the same problems here studied, and have been forced to ponder deeply after school hours how they would win a boy or girl for the child's sake. The tragedy of the whole situation has been lack of understanding and sympathy between the child and the parents and this will be established. If parents take no interest in this move they should not be parents. Teachers have desired it for years.
