

WALLOWA FIVE PLAYS BETTER

LA GRANDE TEAM FORCED TO EXTEND ITSELF.

Details of Interesting Game At Wallowa by High School.

Wallowa, Ore., Feb. 16.—(Special.)—Friday night in Morelock's opera house the Wallowa high school basketball boys met their Waterloo when they were defeated by the La Grande high school by a score of 37 to 26. The game was one of the fastest ever witnessed in Wallowa, and the people saw a game of head and team work, that is seldom excelled in high school teams.

From the time the whistle started the game until it blew for the half both teams played good ball and neither showed their superiority over the other. Both teams missed quite a number of free shots at the baskets. La Grande had hard luck in throwing fouls and quite a number of points went up in smoke. Wallowa also missed their free throws on fouls. When the whistle blew for the half the score was a tie, 12 to 12, with both teams having hopes of putting one over on the other in the next half.

In the first of the second half the La Grangers tightened their teamwork a bit, while the Wallowans appeared to loose their footing to some extent and the visitors summed up quite a number of points while the locals made but few. In the last part of the last half the locals got back into their old form but it was too

late to save the game, although they gained in the last few minutes of play.

Carpy was the main point gainer for the visitors, getting eight baskets. Schofield was close upon his heels with five field baskets and five foul baskets. Bean played a good game at center and did good work in carrying the ball down the field, also making two baskets. Procter and Rosenbaum made a fast pair of guards and watched their men closely. Procter made one basket.

James summed up the greatest number of points for the locals, making six baskets. He also got the jump-off on his opponent the most of the time. McKenzie and Hendricks exhibited good team work and helped to sum up the points for the locals, Hendricks getting two baskets and McKenzie one. Keiffer and Couch played a good game at guards and held down their fast forwards in good shape. The last part of the game was strengthened by the help of Geobel, who went in as guard in place of Keiffer.
