has passed through many vicissitudes. The family pioneered the upper Snake River country when it was uninviting and hard to live in. There a home was built and behind the anvil Mr. Bramwell hammered out a livelihood, until 14 years ago; they moved to La Grande, since which time two children have been born to them, making seven in all, most of whom are well known here and respected by their host of friends and acquaintances.

Mrs. Bramwell's motto was: "Always speak well of the country you live in. If you don't like it, move away and not infest others with the spirit of discontent, but be firm and stable." During the long weeks of suffering Mrs. Bramwell has never been heard to utter one word of complaint, but was always willing to do anything suggested by those in attendance. In the passing of this splendid lady the community loses a substantial citizen; one of broad caliber, sympathetic, ever ready to lend aid to those less fortunate and yet firm in her habits. Her life has been an example to the world and she can say with propriety, "Follow me."

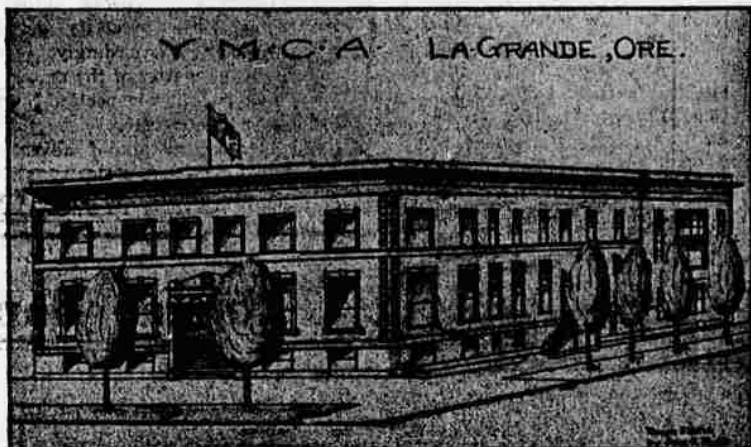
