CHEAP COAL SPOILS WOOD
SALES LOCALLY.

Dealers Have Big Piles of Wood On
Their Hands This Spring.

One thing is certain, there will be no wood famine in La Grande this year. A big lot of cheap coal was sent into La Grande just at the time when wood would ordinarily sell the best, and the coal was freely purchased. The result is that most of the local wood yards have in the neighborhood of 100 cords of wood in their possession for which there is no sale, right now at least.

A snap of cold weather would probably revive the wood business, but right now the dealers have heaps of wood on their hands which they purchased from wood dealers when prices were at the best, and prospects for sales bright. Hence it follows that the lot of the wood and coal man is not all golden.

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PICTURESQUE DAMASCUS.

A Garden City Whose Beauty Halted
Mohammed at Its Gates.

The hotel in Damascus in which we stay is called the Grand Victoria. but it is above a blacksmith shop and a saddle shop. The lower stories are mostly blank, bare walls. From the upper stories project balconies of latted orielis, some of which extend so far over the street as to make it easy for the veiled damsel of the harem to leap across.

In contrast with these plain exteriors the interiors are often exquisitely beautiful, having an open court paved with marble and a fountain fed by the waters of the Abana, tinkling and splashing through the hot hours of the day, and wooing one to rest during the cool of the evening. Palms, orange trees and oleanders stand here and there. Within the house you discover rooms cold and formal to an American, but brilliant with oriental hangings, brasses and inlaid mother-of-pearl furnishings. Damascus is perhaps the second city in importance in the mind of the Mohammedans. It is a garden city made to be indeed an oasis in the desert by the Abana river, which, finding life in the snows of Hermon's breast, flows through this city with increasing volume as it intended to regenerate the desert, into which it pours all its wealth, and does veritably make this section to "blossom as the rose." It is not to be wondered at that Mohammed drew rein outside the walls when first he saw the city and said, "Since man can enter paradise but once, I will not enter this earthly paradise lest I be shut out from the heavenly."—Christian Herald.

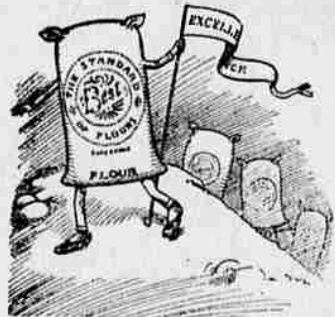
