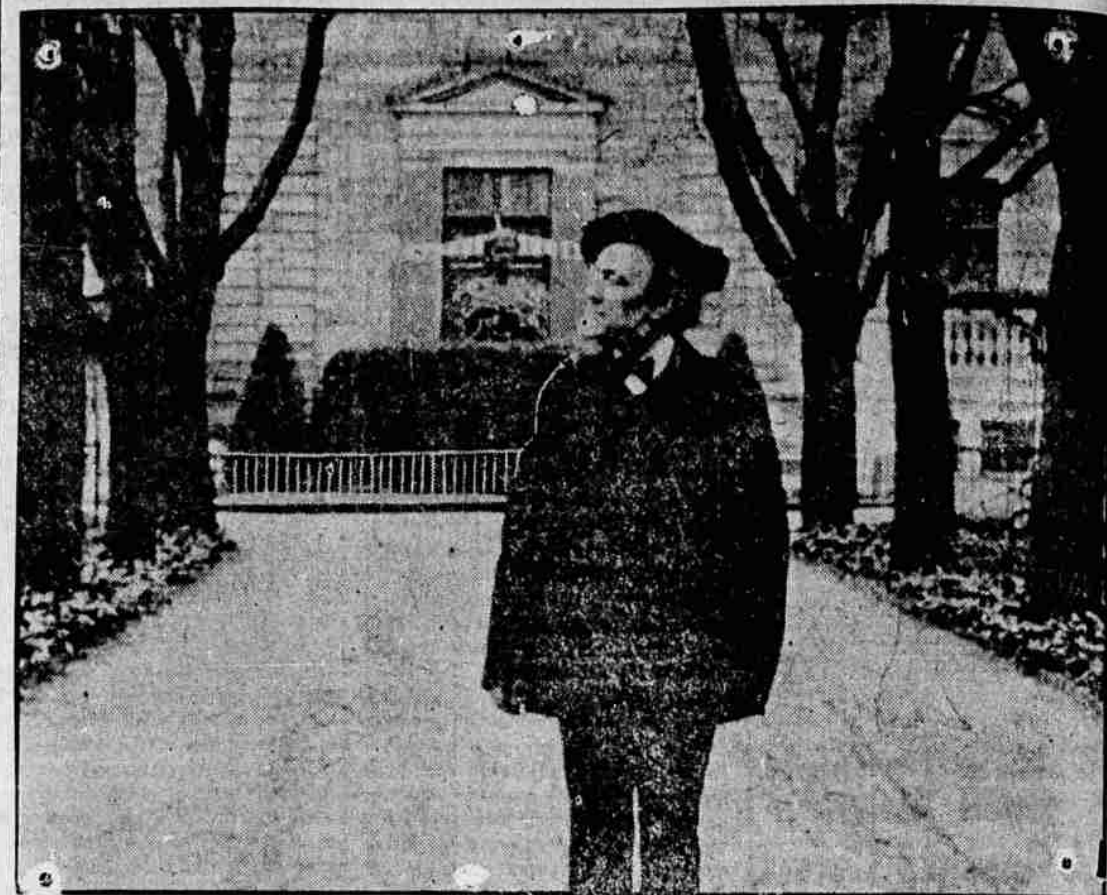
Spoiled Their Appetites.
