NEW WALLOWA BRIDGE DONE

BIG SHORT-CUT TO WALLOWA IS MADE POSSIBLE.

Personal Mention and News Items From and About Wallowa.

Wallowa, Ore., Feb. 24.—(Special.)—The new bridge which was built by the county on Diamond Prairie, is now completed. This bridge is an all steel and stands where the old bridge, which was washed out, stood. Pilings have been driven and two wings have been constructed to steer the water under the bridge, as the river is very wide at this place. The structure was erected by Joe Campbell, the bridge builder, of La Grande. Mr. Campbell deserves much credit for the permanent structure, as this is rather a difficult time of the year to construct a bridge. This opens up the old stage road, which had been rendered nearly useless without a substantial bridge, and will give many farmers a shorter route to this city. The gymnasium has at last been shingled and no more will the storms bother the construction. The task was completed Wednesday evening. As there is plenty of inside work to do now, the rains, snows and the winter weather will not stop the progress from now on.
