Fly Foe Coming.

Doctor C. F. Hodge, the well known expert on city sanitation, and a conspicuous exponent of the "Swat the Fly" movement, will be in La Grande on Tuesday and in the evening will give a lecture in the high school auditorium. The lecture will be interestingly illustrated with lantern slides. The admission is free and all people interested in the abolition of the house fly (typhoid fly) from La Grande, are urged to attend.

Dr. Hodge speaks with authority which comes from experience. He has cleaned up the flies in Worcester, Mass., and in Baltimore, Md., where he worked one summer on this campaign. He had the flies so completely exterminated there were none left for laboratory work. He is now connected with the University of Oregon extension department and last summer he directed a class in the summer school. This class made the necessary surveys for determining the breeding places of the flies in Eugene and the city council took action in cleaning up these places. The result was, when the state health inspector made his usual tour of the state, Eugene stood first as the cleanest from a sanitary point of view. Dr. Hodge puts the children to work and each community works cleaning out the breeding places of flies. The results are wonderful. Can you imagine a flyless summer? In Dr. Hodge's own words, "There is no reason for the people of any community shutting themselves behind screened doors and windows all summer, with the flies left to sport as they will in freedom. Oregon can be entirely free from flies and my plan is to show the people of the state, particularly through the school children and their parents, how this can be done."
