WOOL GROWERS ARE PLEASED

WOOL AUCTIONS IN LONDON SHOW STRENGTH.

Firm Tone in World's Big Wool Market Enthusias Local Growers.

Vegetable List Grows.
Additions to the list of vegetables offered for sale by grocers include: Asparagus, carrots, turnips, beets, spinach, and red cabbage. No changes were quoted this morning.

With the wool buying season now opening in eastern Oregon the London wool auctions now under way are of decided interest through showing the strength of the world market to be very strong and local woolmen are optimistic accordingly.

Predictions in the trade were that prices abroad would move up probably 10 per cent on merinos and 5 per cent on crossbreds. At Thursday's auction in London there was a scramble to buy merinos at 7 1-2 to 10 per cent advance, while bids for crossbreds were advanced 10 to 15 per cent.

At the present London series the offerings amount to 141,000 bales, of which 60,000 bales are New Zealand crossbreds. The offerings at the March sales last year were 163,000 bales, of which 76,000 bales were New Zealand wools.

The cable report of last week's fleecing sales follows:
There were 13,800 bales offered at

the wool sales today. The parcel was largely crossbreds and it was difficult to obtain wool at 7 1-2@10 per cent advance for merinos and 10 to 15 per cent for crossbreds, as the market was in the seller's favor. Americans bought the greasy merinos and crossbreds.

The South American wool market ruled strong throughout the week, shippers at Montevideo reported that wool center bare of any large-size parcels of desirable stock. Europe was a free buyer in Uruguay this season, the bulk of the wool from Montevideo going to Great Britain and the continent.

Advices from Australia were to the effect that the offerings were comparatively light, but that values were being strongly maintained.
