The actual high tide of motion pictures is the Paul J. Rainey African hunt. The pictures for this motion film were not staged after days or weeks of practice, but represent first hand scenes of actual hunting and killing of wild and ferocious animals of the jungles of Africa. The motion picture men accompanied the millionaire, and secured against danger by the small army of black men and dogs and guns against immediate danger to life and limb, took the pictures as they actually occurred. For this reason the pictures are first hand and represent life in the wilds of that sparsely settled country, just as it actually is. The struggle of wild animals with 60 trained dogs and the remarkable courage of the inhabitants of that section make these pictures among the best that have ever been made. On his return Mr. Rainey was offered \$100,000 for two hundred feet of the film. This is some evidence of the worth of the pictures from a point of originality and interest and cannot fail to be both instructive and interesting.

The Rainey expedition consisted of 35 white men, 325 black men, 135 camels, 40 horses, 60 dogs, 54 oxen, and 150 sheep on the hoof. Mr. Rainey, Prof. Hiller of the Smithsonian Institute, and others, and their personal retainers, met Mr. Allen Black of Australia, and Mr. Augustus Outram of The Transvaal, at Port Said, and while traveling to Mombassa, completed their plans. Dr. William Johnson was added as physician and surgeon, and a staff of photographers. At Mombassa the complete Safari, or hunting journey, was arranged. Black giants of the Wakkamandas and Kharkuas, the courageous inky Massi, and smart Somalis, all African tribesmen noted

for their endurance and other worthy qualities, accompanied the expedition, some as employees and carriers and the remainder for the love of the sport.

Mr. Rainey's expedition cost him over \$250,000 and the time consumed was about one year.

Owing to the high price paid for the films the admission is 25 cents for adults and 10 cents for children. The pictures will be here only two days, today and tomorrow.
