Mr. Goodbrod came to the county in the year 1866 and has spent all of his time in this valley, settling at Union where he made his home. He remembers distinctly many of the instances of the early years, when Indians made life uncertain, and when the only means of transportation was by wagon. Mr. Goodbrod is a veteran of the civil war, coming here after the close in 1865. He carries seven wounds received in battle. He was offered a commission in the army but refused.
