ONTARIO PLAN REVIVED AGAIN

END OF DIVISION MAY GO TO
ONTARIO.

Heads of Department Have the Mat-
ter Under Consideration.

Plans for changing the junction be-
tween the Oregon Short Line and the
O.-W. R. & N. company from Hunt-
ington to Ontario, which were con-
sidered about a year ago and aban-
doned, are being revived by the op-
erating heads of the affected roads.

This movement is desired because
it will give the O.-W. R. & N. com-
pany physical connection with the
Oregon Eastern, which it now is build-
ing westward from Ontario through
Vale; but the cost involved may make
it prohibitive.

All the property between Hunting-
ton and Ontario is owned by the Ore-
gon Short Line, which also owns the
O.-W. R. & N. company, but to effect
a change of this property, a transfer
of all the real estate and all the other
property involved would have to be
made from the Short Line to the O.-
W. R. & N. company, the same as if it
were being sold to another corpora-
tion.

Additional expense would result in
changing the tickets and tariffs. All
tickets break at Huntington; a sepa-
rate stub is required for the haul on
either side of Huntington. If the
change is made, all these stubs will
have to be made to break at Ontario
instead.

The tariffs would have to be revised
to allow the O.-W. R. & N. company
a division on the entire haul on both
freight and passenger business west of
Ontario, instead of west of Hunting-
ton.

If the change is made the O.-W. R.
& N. company also will take over the
60 miles of road between Huntington
and Homestead, Ore., now owned and
operated by the Short Line. The dis-
tance between Huntington and Ontario
is 40 miles. The proposed change
therefore would give the O.-W. R. &
N. company 100 miles of additional
mileage.

Although the O.-W. R. & N. com-
pany owns the Oregon Eastern, the
Short Line is operating this road under
lease. Meanwhile the O.-W. R. & N.
company is doing the construction
work. Rapid progress is being made
west of Junction.

By changing the junction from
Huntington to Ontario, the O.-W. R.
& N. company will be able to operate
the Oregon Eastern.

Territory Part of System.

It is pointed out that the territory
west of Ontario is naturally a part of
the O.-W. R. & N. system and that it
can be operated to better advantage
from Portland than from Salt Lake
City.

The division points would remain
at Huntington and at Nampa, Idaho.
Train crews would continue to run
through Ontario and the costs would
be apportioned between the two roads.

Ontario, however, would be made a
division point for the new Oregon
Eastern and it is probable that small
yards and shops would be built there
to accommodate the needs of the East-
ern Oregon line.

Reade in Very Grave Condition.

Baker, March 11.—J. W. Reade,
train dispatch of the Sumpter Valley,
who was badly injured in a collision,
in which his motor car was run down
by a switch engine in the local rail-
road yards week before last, is in a
very grave condition at the hospital.
A consultation of doctors was held in
his case yesterday afternoon, and his
condition is such that little hope is
held out for his recovery. His in-
ternal injuries are of a very severe
nature, and he has shown no im-
provement since the first. Mr.
Reade, while not long a resident of
Baker, made many warm friends, and
his condition is such as to arouse deep-
est sympathy.

Mr. Reade is a member of the Ma-
sonic lodge at Tucson, Arizona, and
was a resident of San Francisco be-
fore coming to this city to take the
position he was holding when he met
with his misfortune.

PLANT MAY BE SOLD.

Offer Received by City for Idle Ma-
chinery at Pumping Plant.

When the city commission meets to-
night it will take up for consideration
an offer by the Eastern Oregon Light
& Power company for the purchase of
the idle machinery in the pumping
plant, thrown out of commission, first
by the construction of the Beaver
creek plant and later made useless for
emergency purposes by connections
with the Palmer mill water plant. The
commission, water superintendent
Hoyt and Manager Lafky have the
matter under consideration today and
it is likely that final action will be
taken this evening. The former coun-
cil decided to dispose of the plant, but
up to the present time, there has been
no offer made that appealed to the
officials.

SHINGLE STRIKE ENDS.

Millowners Gain Many Points Over
Strikers—Open Shop Prevails.

Raymond, Wash., March 11.—After
a conference lasting all night between
W. T. Boyce of the department of
labor, and J. G. Brown, president of
the timber workers union, and E. E.
Case and other mill operators the
strike between the shingle weavers
which has been in force since the 18th
of February is called off. The men
will return to work tomorrow. The
terms of the agreement are practically
an acceptance of the conditions pro-
mulgated by the millowners in their
ultimatum following the declaration
to strike, and mean that the open shop
will prevail. It also means that the
millowners dare not discriminate
against the unionists. The latter will
not be permitted to agitate. The strik-
ers will be taken back as openings oc-
cur in the ranks of men now at work.

FLYLESS CITY PLANS.

ments. There would be much use if
they would go about it right."

Where cows, horses or poultry, are
kept in the city he advises that peo-
ple use the manure as fertilizer in-
stead of allowing it to accumulate.
The soil will take care of a great
amount of this fertilizer and, mixed
with a very little soil, it ceases to be
a breeding place for flies.

Dr. Hodge thinks that if La Grande
people enter into the campaign with
the right spirit they will have no dif-
ficulty in having a flyless city by
June. But he warns against laxness
in the late summer.

"By ceasing the warfare for a few
weeks you will have enough flies by
fall," he said, "to stock the country."

Last evening the speaker advocated,
besides traps, poisoning, as particu-
larly applicable to this climate.

"Indoor poisoning methods have
long been in vogue and since flies
are thirsty creatures, it is quite pos-
sible that used consistently out of
doors, this line of attack may prove
the easiest solution of the whole prob-
lem. The common germicide, formal-
in, is now recommended as the safest
poison to use and for ease of applica-
tion a bottle filled with 2 per cent so-
lution (eight teaspoonfuls to a quart
of water) may be inverted over a sau-
cer and stood on a shelf or hung on a
bracket in any sunny corner about a
stable or back porch. It should be
set out of reach of dogs and birds
may be protected from drinking it by
surrounding it with coarse meshed
netting. A nick is broken in the mouth
of the bottle so that the liquid will
partially fill the saucer, and a slice
of bread covered with sugar
