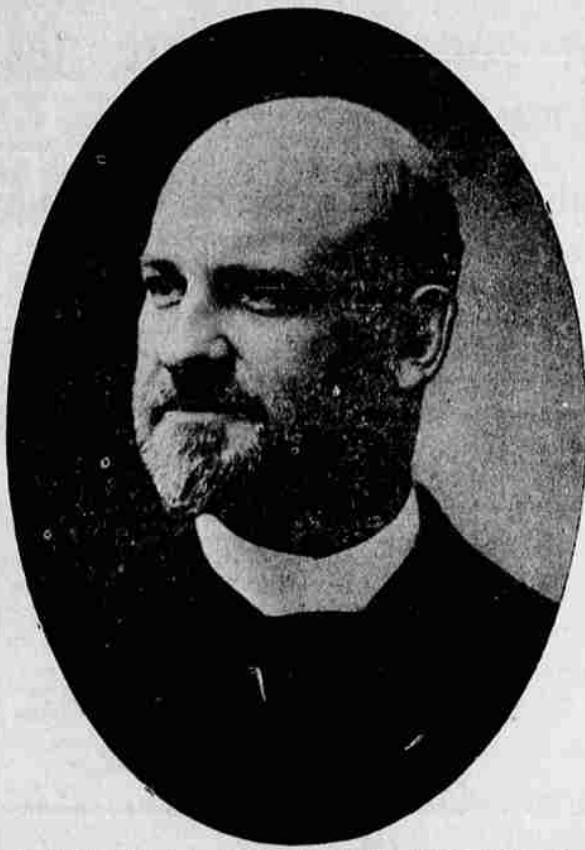


## ROBERT MORROW SEEKS SEAT ON SUPREME COURT BENCH



Robert G. Morrow, who aspires to the Supreme Bench and who will be a candidate for nomination at the Republican primaries in May.

He was born in December, 1861, in Michigan; son of Henry A. Morrow, who, in 1862 was judge of the recorder's court of Detroit, a court having criminal jurisdiction throughout Wayne county, and corresponding to the circuit court of Oregon. Most of his younger days were spent in the west, was educated at University of Michigan between 1878 and 1883. Graduated from Michigan University, Bachelor of Philosophy. Lived in Salt Lake City, Utah, and in South Dakota, at old Ford Buford, and at Fort Bridger, in Wyoming, when these places had to be reached by a march overland. After graduating went to

Portland and read law with Judge Williams, late mayor of Portland, and was admitted to the bar in October, 1885. He practiced in Portland until elected to the circuit bench in 1908.

In 1892 he was appointed reporter of the supreme court of Oregon, an editorial position requiring the study and consideration of all opinions rendered by the court and the preparation of head notes, together with all editorial work connected with the publication of the Oregon Reports. He held this position until 1905, when he resigned to become circuit judge. Published twenty-five Oregon Reports.—Adv.

## PENDLETON QUITS LEAGUE

PLAN IS TO LET FRANCHISE  
SLIP AWAY.

Principal Business Men of Pendleton,  
Refuse to Produce Coin.

Pendleton, March 12.—It is now very probable that Pendleton will not maintain a club in the Western Tri-state league this season, the decision reached recently at a mass meeting to the contrary notwithstanding.

Discouraged and disappointed by the refusal of several of the leading business institutions of the city to contribute toward the initial fund, the directors this morning threw up their hands and announced that they would probably send releases to all players under contract within a few days. There is a bare chance that they will make another effort to save the Pendleton franchise, but, judging from their attitude and announcements this morning it is a slim chance indeed.

During the two hours they spent Monday soliciting funds they met with some encouragement, one private individual and two business institutions signing for \$100 each. However, this morning two of the leading business establishments which have heretofore liberally contributed, announced they would give nothing and this ended the campaign.

"We can go ahead and raise the money regardless," said one of the directors this morning, "but we figure that if the leading business institutions are not going to support baseball then we cannot ask the lesser ones to do it. We are only trying to raise about half what we raised last year and believe we can run the club on that amount under the new plan. But if the people don't want baseball at that price we won't thrust it upon them."
