PAYROLL FOR MEAT IS BIG

OVER MILLION AND HALF SPENT
IN YEAR.

Packing Company at North Portland
Enters Local Territory.

Eggs Drop to 20c.

After hanging in the balance
since last Saturday, eggs today
went down to 20 cents. Local
merchants lose heavily by the
sudden bearish movement.
Nearly every grocer had a big
supply of 30 cent eggs, some
even 35c, and a vast quantity
of 25 cent eggs, which they
must now unload at 20 cents.
Protracted spring weather is
given as the cause.

Breaking in on the Swift and Ar-
mour packing business, the Union
Meat company of Portland is pushing
its trade into Eastern Oregon at the
same time that it is driving its trade
into Alaska, across the Pacific and
elsewhere that markets can be found.
J. T. Rea, traveling salesman for the
North Portland company, is in La
Grande today. This is the first time
during the several years that the com-
pany has been buying Eastern Oregon
stock that it has attempted to send
back the finished products of cattle
and hogs, which originally came from
his selection. The firm hopes to go
east to Baker with its trade and will
meet the competition of eastern pack-
ers in the distribution of lards, hams
and bacon.

Payroll Here Enormous.
During 1913 the Union Meat com-
pany spent \$1,600,000 in Union, Wal-
lowa, Baker, Malheur and Grant coun-
ties. This was principally for hogs
and cattle, though some sheep was
included. Prior to the time that the
company at Portland handled all this
shipment, dealers were forced to ship
farther and at less remunerative
prices.
