STOCKMEN ASK FOR INSPECTION OF ALL STOCK SHIPMENTS

Mr. and Mrs. L. Lloyd of Imnaha, passed through the city this morning en route to their home farm. They have just returned from Pendleton where Mr. Lloyd attended the annual meeting of the Cattle and Horse Raisers association. The meeting this year was fruitful of many suggestions that may eventually become law, chief of which may be cited the one pertaining to the stealing of livestock. Some drastic measures will be recommended to the legislature to lessen thefts of livestock. Among these is one requiring meat men, butchers, etc., to keep a record of the brands on the hides in their possession. Henry Hass of Enterprise was also in attendance at the meeting. A detailed account of the meeting is taken from the Pendleton East Oregonian and is as follows:

Stockmen of Oregon will not ask the next legislature to create a livestock commission for inspecting purposes in all probability but will ask instead a bill providing for county inspectors to be appointed by the governor. This was the recommendation made this morning to the State Cattle and Horse Raisers' association, which is holding its annual convention in this city, by its legislative committee.

Because of the fact that there now seems to be prevalent throughout the state an antipathy toward state commissions, the committee reported that it would not at this time be advisable to attempt to add another to the list and in this report President Pollman concurred. A measure to secure temporary relief would be preferable, he stated, and he expressed the hope that in another two years they could secure a commission such as some other states have.

The proposed legislation would require that all stock be inspected prior to being shipped or driven from one county to another or into another state and that the inspection charges be paid by the owner of the stock at the rate of ten cents a head for the first 25 head and three cents a head thereafter. The inspector shall also be paid ten cents a mile for every mile he travels to make the inspection, the bill further provides.

Another provision which the committee recommended be incorporated in the bill is one requiring all hides of slaughtered animals to be inspected before being offered for shipment, the charge to be ten cents a hide. The committee would also have every purchaser of hides and every slaughterer to keep a complete record of the hides purchased. These provisions made into law, the stockmen believe, would make it harder for cattle thieves to operate.

The stockmen also desire that hereafter records of brands be kept on file in the office of the secretary of state instead of with the various county clerks.

About 50 stockmen, representing the states of Idaho, Washington and Oregon, are attending the convention. This association was organized at Baker on May 14, 1913, with 51 members with the intention of making it exclusively an Oregon society, but since that time it has been deemed

advisable to permit cattle and horse breeders from Idaho and Washington to become members and the committee on legislation has made disposition to that effect. There were registered as members up to this morning one hundred and ninety-nine. Briefly stated, the object of this organization is to guard and promote the interests of the cattle and horse raisers, promote a more perfect organization among them and cultivate a more fraternal feeling between the cattlemen in general.
