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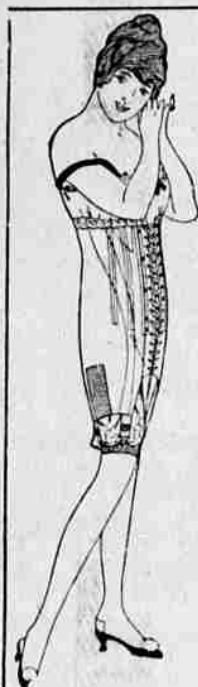

TRUCK IS IN COMPETITION

HARRY WEIMER INSTALLS MOTOR SERVICE TO COVE

Claims it is Great Advantage to Both La Grande and Cove.

The Federal good roads movement which has been advocating motor trucks for transportation instead of trolley lines where proper highways are constructed, should send a representative to Union county. While the good roads are not in abundance here this county does have a truck service that is to be considered.

Harry Weiner, formerly of La Grande, but now a resident of Cove, has installed a regular truck service across the country to Cove and will handle passengers and freight. Last summer he tried the project out as

an experiment and he now announces results were so satisfactory he intends to make the service permanent through the season of the year that roads will permit.

Mr. Weimer says he has the railroads bested in many ways; that he can bring Cove people to La Grande and take them home the same day; that less time is consumed, and when it comes to freight he is positive of his ability to land freight into Cove from La Grande for less money than the railroads charge.

It is admitted by all that the service is of great benefit to Cove and La Grande and will be a wonderful advantage during the fruit packing period.

Mr. Weimer has a first class truck equipment and if the business justifies it he will put on a second truck.

FERRINS ESCAPE INJURY.

Collision of Bicycle and Auto Near Serious for Father and Son.

While riding westward on Depot street on his bicycle with his small son Winn on the handlebars, C. P. Ferrin was run down late yesterday afternoon on the crossing of Depot and Adams. A car stood on the southeast corner of the crossing and in turning out to pass it he could not see Chas. McCrary approaching in his auto from the east. Mr. McCrary was on the right side of the street, but when Mr. Ferrin observed the approaching vehicle, made an effort to evade it but was caught by the machine and thrown to the ground. In the fall Mr. Ferrin threw up his leg to protect the boy and both came down with a thud, scarcely a foot from the front wheels of the machine.

Fortunately neither father nor son was seriously hurt. Mr. Ferrin sustained a small wound below the knee, but the boy was not hurt. He is at work today. The front wheel of the bicycle was wrecked. Careful and slow driving on the part of Mr. McCrary was responsible for so small damage.

CASE REACHES JURY.

Hamilton vs. Grande Ronde Lumber Company Next Case Called.

After taking testimony for two days in the case of Lone Pine Irrigation company vs. Welch, the jury this afternoon were charged and sent to the jury room to deliberate.

This case is to be followed by that of Hamilton vs. the Grande Ronde Lumber company of Perry. This is a suit for damages arising out of an alleged trespass on the plaintiff's land. The plaintiff will admit that the defendant company was given a parole license to convey logs across his premises, to build the necessary skidways and to do such other things necessarily connected with the moving of logs from one place to another, subject to the condition however, that the defendant company likewise move Plaintiff Hamilton's logs down to the river where they could be rolled into the steam and conveyed wherever he chose to convey them. The plaintiff will seek to show that the defendant company, through an agent, did all of these things, used buildings for a period of eighteen months or thereabouts, but did not comply with the condition.

The defendant will plead the parole license to use the land in the manner described, but will deny that it was to perform the work for the plaintiff which he sets out in his complaint. R. J. Green will represent the plaintiff and C. H. Finn the defendant.
