MEN ARE TO HAVE RELIGIOUS INNOVATION.

Honan Hall Services of 25 Minutes Duration Through Two Weeks.

Short, snappy noonday services for men are to be held in Honan hall Passion week and Holy week. The hours have been arranged so that workmen, clerks and business men can drop in for a few minutes and still get to their lunches within the hour. The plan is a unique one and will undoubtedly be of much success. The services are being arranged by Reverends W. C. Drahn and Upton H. Gibbs and will be assisted by other pastors of the city.

This is the first time that La Grande has been promised such services, and that they will be a tremendous success is deemed a certainty.

Passion week begins Monday, March 30, and each day of that week and each day of Holy week commencing April 6, these services will be held. The feature of the plan is that the meetings will start on the minute and end on the minute; no dragging is to be permitted. At 12:05 they will open and close at 12:30.
