The session yesterday morning began with communion service, presided over by District Superintendent Winters. Next on the program was disciplinary matters, and reports of the district superintendent and pastors. The most important business of the morning was the action taken to dissolve the district conference and organize a district association in its place. The purpose of this move is to make it possible to get quicker action when important changes are needed at once. H. H. Cleaver of Alicel was granted a local preacher's license, and the licenses of N. D. Stittler and T. A. Brassfield were renewed.

The steps taken to simplify work was to the effect that hereafter quarterly conferences will have the powers to carry out work now done by the district conventions, and ministerial associations take the place of the conventions. These conventions are not to be confused with conferences which are held annually.

Rev. E. B. Fyke of La Grande, returned to his home this morning, and the convention closes this evening.

The first part of the afternoon session was devoted to the question of finance. Rev. C. A. Quinn spoke of the new financial plan. Rev. A. L. Cathers had a paper on the subject

of things. Rev. E. B. Fyke gave an inspiring talk as to what finances include, how to handle them, and the pastors responsibility. The session ended with an address that was a favorite of the conference so far as conducted, judging by the interest manifested. This was by Rev. C. A. Edwards of Baker on "The Greatest Thing in the World."

Rev. J. A. Martin of Union delivered the address last evening.

Celebrate Commercial Tercentenary.

New York, March 27.—A series of historical, religious and educational exercises scientific, artistic and commercial exhibits, street parades, pageants and other festivities which will continue through October 11, began today as the opening of the celebration of the three hundredth anniversary of the beginning of the regularly chartered commerce of what now are the city and state of New York.

The period of the celebration of the Tercentenary of Commerce from today until October 11 will be distinguished by two points of national interest, the opening of the Panama Canal and the rounding out of a centennial of peace between the English speaking peoples. Special exhibitions are to be held at various times during this period by New York's most famous museum and technical societies, and local and state universities will hold educational symposiums and establish in
