LAND DISPUTE ENDS FATALLY.

Reason Is Lost and Enraged Farmers Take to Gun—Three Die.

Little Rock, Ark., March 28.—Three persons are dead at Mogo, a small town near this city, as the result of a quarrel over a tract of land. John Church one of the disputants shot dead by C. W. Hart, when the two met in the road. Church's wife then spread the news to the relatives and these immediately grasped their guns and rushed to the scene of the tragedy. Hart was then near his home but the enraged relatives of Church invaded his premises opened fire on him and killed him in the presence of his family.

Francis McCuin a neighbor who had taken part in the controversy was likewise killed in his own home by a shot fired through his window.

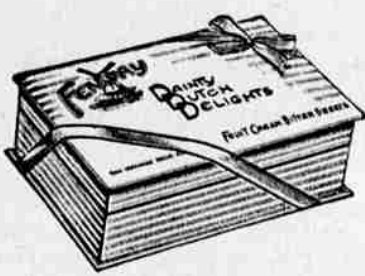
