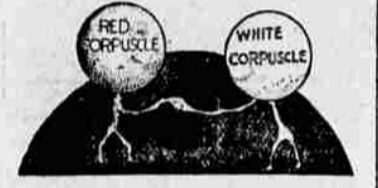

Seaboard Cities May Get Coal Cheap.

Philadelphia, March 30.—Cities along the Atlantic seaboard receiving Pennsylvania anthracite coal by water may be benefited by a proposed reduction in price as a result of the hearing resumed here today by the Public Utilities Commission into the cost of transportation of the coal to this seaport. An exhaustive expert accountants' report showed that the railroads charged about three times what the service cost them. Nearly 2,000,000 tons leave this port annually for New England and other points.
