PEARE WANTED FOR THE SENATE

UMATAILLA COUNTY REQUESTS
LOCAL MAN TO RUN.

Ask that La Grande Furnish Joint
Senator for This District.

Is Jack Peare, after long years of
party affiliation and help to others
seeking office, going to finally run
for an office himself?

This is a political question that is
causing some remarks right now. It

is known that several prominent re-
publicans from Umatilla county have
asked Mr. Peare to run for joint
senator from this district and a
number of home people, as soon as the
matter had been mentioned to them,
have sworn allegiance to the man who
has stood on guard by day and by
night for the last twenty years.

Umatilla has usually furnished the
man for this office. C. A. Barrett,
the present senator, comes from
Athena and he is a candidate to suc-
ceed himself, but there are a number
who want a change and these have
been beseeching Mr. Peare to get into
the contest.

When seen by the Observer today
Mr. Peare said: "No, I have never
run for office in my life. I have al-
ways enjoyed helping able members
of my party to office rather than to

run myself. I am not a candidate for
anything."

Even with this sort of an answer
there are those who think the old
political war horse might be induced
to take a seat in the senate for the
purpose of carrying out some of his
personal ideas of commissions and
curtailing of state house expense.

While The Dalles Chronicle may be
terribly enthusiastic over the candi-
dacy of Judge Bennett of that city for
governor, it has never-the-less ana-
lyzed the situation in a way that would
seem reasonably fair and its opinion
is that Bennett has the Jackson-
West-Chamberlain democratic ma-
chine flogged to a finish and The
Chronicle thinks "Doc" Smith,
who is the machine choice for govern-
or, is beaten right now; that democ-
rats of standing are not going to
support any more sensational candi-
dates in their party but are looking
for hard headed statesmen to carry
the party banner. Whether the
Chronicle is entirely correct in its
conclusions is not material, for it is
only half right in its declaration that
vaudeville stunts in democratic poli-
tics are over in Oregon, the meaning
is clear that Jackson's machine is out
of business.

Bank Denied New Trial.

At the conclusion of the arguments
upon the motion for a new trial filed
by the Powder Valley State Bank, of
North Powder, in its action upon a
note against A. B. Hudelson & Son, of
North Powder, Judge Knowles this
morning denied the motion. The judge
did not deem it necessary to find any-
thing further than that there was
some evidence in the record to sup-
port the verdict, new trials now be-
ing possible in trial courts only when
the judge can say that there was no
evidence whatever for that purpose.

In the action, the defendants claim-
ed that an amount of money sufficient
to pay off the note had been paid to
the bank, but that instead of credit-
ing Hudelson, the bank had applied
the money to its own indebtedness
from the party paying the money. The
bank justified this course by reason
of an assignment it held of the sums
to become due to the debtor of both
the bank and the defendant. The jury
however, found for Hudelson, and the
motion for a new trial followed.

The bank's attorneys, Cochran &
Eberhard, announced this morning
that an appeal would be filed imme-
diately. Messrs. Jno. S. Hodgkin and
J. D. Slater represented the defend-
ants.

PENNEY LINE REACHES CITY

THE UNITED STORE IS PART
OF 70.

General Merchandise Store to Be
Opened Here April 6th.

April 6, A. D. Frost of Pendleton
and J. C. Penney, supreme head of
the string of 70 Penney stores, will,
under the firm name of Frost & Pen-
ney, open the United Store, of gen-
eral merchandising, in this city. C. E.
Short will be the manager and F. E.
Liningood will be in charge of the
drygoods department. The establish-
ment will occupy the Lewis building
on Depot street and the place has
been extensively repaired for it.

The store contemplates carrying a
complete line of general merchandise.
"There are many features about the
Penney string of stores" said Man-
ager Short today, in announcing the
opening, "but none are more impor-
tant than the one of buying. The
string is made up of a series of small
chains all within the big one, and Mr.
Frost of Pendleton is the head of one
of the these—five this time, Pendle-
ton, The Dalles, La Grande and else-
where. In time this store will create
new stores with La Grande as the
center. In it and all others Mr. Pen-
ney is part owner. But the entire 70
or more stores, are supplied with stock
through one purchase selected by the
different heads. Mr. Frost selects
the goods for his portion of the string,
but the 70 stores order in one lot
though from some 40 different men.
The syndicate has a jobbing house
and we buy through it direct from the
manufacturer and distribute from Salt
Lake. This permits us to run a line
of goods of good quality purchased
at bigger discount than the small lot
purchaser who handles through mid-
dlemen. We buy for cash, sell for
cash and not one of the 70 stores car-
ries a line of credit."
